
2024-25 HIGHLIGHTS





PROJECTS

National Outreach Project

CWICE launched the National Outreach Project, funded by the Northpine Foundation, in collaboration with the Peel Children's Aid Foundation. The project will support child welfare professionals across **6** provinces through capacity building, with a focus on government-assisted refugees.

Service

CWICE supported **714** individuals across all service types. Our diverse clients are connected to **84** countries of origin, across **6** continents.

Repatriations with Global Affairs Canada Project

CWICE received 14 referrals relating to 26 individuals/families.

Citizenship Project

CWICE received **67** new citizenship inquiry referrals from across the province.

UASC Project

CWICE received a total of 112 referrals for UASC.





TRAINING 1.473 TOTAL ATTENDANCE SINCE 2020

166 total attendance (2024/25), from **9** Child Welfare Organizations across SK, MB, PEI, NS, and ON

Staff from 12 agencies from NS, MB, and ON joined the new training course Building and Bridging Together: Child Welfare, Immigration, and Settlement Sectors: child welfare, education, social services, housing/shelter system, settlement, and resettlement sectors.
